Joseph and Ivan

Joseph is the father of Ivan, a new child in the preschool room. Joseph brings his son to school every day, and they are late at least two or three times a week. Both Joseph and Ivan look disheveled and in a hurry. They tend to arrive just as the group is cleaning up the morning snack and transitioning to circle time.
