Major Budget Actions

\$78.2 Million Early Literacy	 \$68.2 million on a one-time basis to establish the Statewide Imagination Library, a California iteration of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, under the administration of the State Librarian. \$10 million to CDPH and F5CA to provides books for low-income children. Complemented by F5CA's investment of \$18 million.
\$100 Million California HOPE	 Creates trust accounts for children who have lost a parent/primary caregiver to COVID and children in long-term foster care.
\$290 Million Behavioral Health	 Grant support for well-being and mindfulness programs, as well as parent support education programs. Grant support for children and youth at increased risk of suicide and a youth suicide crisis response pilot program. Establishes a center for researching, evaluating, and applying innovative new technologies to improve youth mental health.
\$200 Million Reproductive Health	 Expands access to reproductive healthcare services, improve clinical infrastructure, and expand the workforce in reproductive healthcare services.

\$69 Million Young Child Tax Credit	 Expands the definition of qualified taxpayer to include individuals who have a qualified child and would have received the EITC but has earned income of zero dollars or less in the taxable year. 	
\$9.5 Billion Better for Families Tax Refund	 Provides payments ranging from \$200 to \$1,050 based on income thresholds to over 17 million families to offset rising prices of food, gas, and commodities, distributed by October 2022. 	



Missed Opportunities

\$1.3 Billion	 The final state budget removed the legislative budget request to increase child care reimbursement rates to the 	
Child Care Stabilization	85 th percentile of the regional market rate (RMR) and apply COLA to the county RMR for all provider rates.	
\$30 Million Diaper and Wipe Distribution	 The final state budget removed the legislative budget request to support grants to provide diapers and wipes for low-income families with young children. 	
Paid Family Leave	 The final state budget removed the legislative budget request to extend the existing wage replacement rates for the State Disability Insurance and Paid Family Leave programs, which is set to sunset January 1, 2023.

Behavioral Health	The 2021-22 Budget Act invested \$4.4 billion to reimagine the behavioral health ecosystem and the 2022-23 Budget Act provided \$290 million to implement a multi-pronged approach to address children and youth mental health crisis.	Invest \$50 million to design and implement system changes specific to age 0-5, provide parents and caregivers about awareness and early signs of mental health challenges and connect to services.
Fatherhood	Significant opportunity to engage all fathers, especially those in low-income and minority communities to connect and proactively engage with their children ages 0-5.	Invest \$5 million seed funding to launch a Fatherhood Initiative designed to support fathers, especially those involved in the child welfare and criminal justice systems.
Child Care	California is focused on: 1) promoting and expanding quality programs and services; 2) employing a two-generational strategy of investing in parent so they can invest more in their children; and 3) easing financial pressures on parents.	Invest \$15 million in grants to support provider stipends, tuition reimbursement, and funding of cohort models and apprenticeships.
Data	Manage large quantities of data across health and human services but lack the insights and information from that data to improve programs and services for families and children ages 0-5. The Cradle-to-Career System looks to integrate the siloes of information.	Invest \$3 million to develop a data use case that combines the Strong Start Index with the Health Places Index to disrupt inequities and sharpen focus and investments in disadvantaged communities.
