First 5 California Policy Review and Position Process

- 1. The Public Policy Advisory Committee (PPAC) approves an annual young children's policy agenda that sets the direction and policy focus at the state and federal levels.
- Governmental Affairs staff analyze, review, and develop a comprehensive list of legislative, budget, and regulatory proposals that align with the First 5 California (F5CA) young children's policy agendas for the PPAC to review and provide feedback.
- 3. Legislative bills, budget, and regulatory proposals will be labeled with recommended positions and priority levels. Bills will be categorized by policy agenda priority areas (see Attachments B and C).
- 4. Materials corresponding for each proposal will include:
 - Current law
 - Brief description of proposed change
 - Analysis, position recommendation and policy priority
 - Hyperlink to the bill or draft regulation
 - Status of the bill or draft regulation
 - Background if author/sponsors reached out to F5CA
 - Fact sheet, if available
- 5. Governmental Affairs staff will meet with the PPAC Chair to discuss and review proposals and agenda materials, prior to publishing for each PPAC meeting.

- 6. At the PPAC meeting, the Advisory Chair and Governmental Affairs staff will present on critical proposals and seek guidance and input from committee members.
- 7. Staff will intake feedback, guidance, and recommendations.
- 8. Staff will provide written status on proposals at future policy committee meetings if information is available.
- 9. The Agenda for each PPAC meeting will be posted within 10 days prior to a committee meeting for the review of committee members and the public.
- 10. The materials for each PPAC meeting will be posted three days prior to a committee meeting for the review of committee members and the public.
