Small Population County Funding Augmentation (SPCFA)

- The California Children and Families Act (the Act; Prop 10) establishes the California Children and Families Trust Fund and authorizes expenditures from the Fund to ensure that children are ready to enter school.
- First 5 California's Small Population County Funding Augmentation (SPCFA) program provides funding to augment annual tax revenues to local First 5 Commissions in counties with small populations and low birth rates.
- The goal of the SPCFA is to support the success of small counties in their work and to ensure Proposition 10 is truly a statewide effort that impacts the lives of young children throughout California.
- SPCFA funding makes it possible for Proposition 10 to be a statewide effort that promotes, supports, and improves the early development of children ages 0 through 5.





First 5 CA Theory of Change

Theory of change describes the levers, actions, and outcomes of F5CA's work:




F5CA System Levers:

- Advocate: Advocate to federal and state policy makers
- Convener/Connector: Bring together state agencies that support young children and their families
- Catalyst: Provide funding for research and evaluation, innovative practices, and collaboration between different systems
- Broadcaster: Communicate to the general public utilizing television, radio, newspapers, and other mass media




An Estimated 7,330 Babies Were Born in SPCFA Counties in 2022

SPCFA: Past and Current Funding Background

- Past: Since 1999-2000, the F5CA Commission approved augmented funding of up to \$200,000 (average amount).
- <u>Current:</u> At January 2021 meeting, the F5CA Commission approved an investment of up to \$20 million over 4.25 years, beginning **April 1, 2021, through June 30, 2025**.
 - Request for Application (RFA) offered eligible counties up to 3.25 years of funding (April 1, 2021, through June 30, 2024), with the option 1-year extension based on performance during the grant period.



**Contract and Requisition List (CARL): Form and process utilized to fulfill F5CA/State of California policy and process requirements and to build the agreement documentation. At a minimum, the CARL is accompanied by the following:

***CRTS is Content Review and Tracking System: F5CA's Approval system



SPCFA: Highlights

- Leverage Braided Funding Efforts and Partnerships:
 - Local, County, State and Federal
 - Medi-Cal Administrative Activities (MAA): federal reimbursement for the cost of performing administrative activities that directly support efforts to identify and enroll potential eligible individuals into Medi-Cal
 - CalFresh
 - United Way
 - Diverse Types of Fundraising
- Partnerships/Funding:
- YMCA, School Districts, Adoptive Parent Support Program, MHSA, child welfare, and schools, and rental support



With a systematic, coordinated and equitable approach, First 5 small counties continue to evolve as a leader and champion for the children and families of their counties



SPCFA: Highlights


- Calaveras began a focus on IECMH, continues to be a resource for basic needs in their rural community, and received over \$272k in grant funds last FY. New Efforts: Metta Services and Social-Emotional Coaching Services. Partnership with Calaveras Community Foundation to implement Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.
- Colusa began a program called *Bumps and Beyond* to support peri/post-natal parents and brought in over \$113k in other public funds last FY. Largest engagement is through nutrition and food access programs.
- Del Norte developed a culturally appropriate texting program (parent support) Ready4K to promote school readiness and received over \$163k in grants.
- Mono continues to invest in two key programs: Welcome Baby and Health Families (HV) and Childcare Quality Systems to service licensed providers and received over \$479k in grants. F5 Mono staff has built trust in community, to engage high proportion of clients with Latino Heritage.
- Mendocino has adopted an equity statement to guide communication and protect families, children, and communities against racism, oppression, and inequality, which has built relationships with indigenous and BIPOC populations, and has received over \$736k in grants. Professional Development to fully address Adverse Childhood Experiences.
- Plumas is beginning work on Fatherhood Engagement, recently launched a Help Me Grow program, and earned over \$18k from MAA. Support the launched of county 211 system.
- San Benito helms a local multisector collaborative of over 20 agencies/participants and received over \$596k in grants. Closing digital divide (distribution Chromebooks) and weekly food and essential supplies.

- First 5 Amador contributes its success to cross referrals: Welcome Baby (local HV Model) and F5CA Kit for New Parents, Playgroups, Messy Mornings, and partnerships with the county library and WIC.
- Messy Mornings (conducted in First 5 Amador's Outdoor Learning Lab) was launched the end of fiscal year 21-22 with the goal of providing a child-led experience
 that encouraged children to explore, play, and learn.
 - Has the highest participation rate of all First 5 events with 30–45 children and their caregivers in attendance each week
 - Community Support: mothers, fathers, grandparents and family, friends, and neighbor caregivers
- Amador's Quality for Kids provided an opportunity for childcare providers, preschool teachers and family, friend, and neighbor caregivers to participate in educational opportunities that enhance the care they provide to children 0–5.
 - The 30 Quality for Kids participants received financial incentives as well as early education materials that address their individual quality improvement plans.
